



Bruton Summertime

On 5 July, Deanery Synod discussed and approved a proposal for the re-organisation of the grouping of parishes into Benefices across our Deanery. Under this proposal, our Benefice would be enlarged by the addition of a single parish: Bratton Seymour. This is a smaller enlargement than would have been the case under some of the other proposals that were

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under consideration. For those who were and are uneasy at the prospect of the Benefice becoming larger, this is therefore a welcome development.

However, things may not be guite as simple as they appear. It is likely that the formula used to calculate each parish's contribution to the Common Fund (i.e. each parish's 'Parish Share') will be changed in the not-too-distant future. This has already been floated at Diocesan Synod, although no firm proposals have yet been advanced. If this change is progressed, it is likely that the substance of the change would be to move away from a formula based on the number of people in the congregation and instead use a formula based on the amount of stipendiary ministry provided by our Diocese to each Benefice. It is very likely that there will still be an adjustment based on socio-economic factors, with parishes in more deprived areas being asked to pay a reduced amount. That reduction will not apply to any of our parishes - we are relatively affluent compared with some in other parts of the Diocese. The basis of the new formula is likely to be that each Benefice pays an amount that corresponds to the amount of stipendiary ministry it receives. In our Benefice, we have 1 stipendiary priest. So it is likely that our combined parish share for the Benefice will be set at an amount that reflects the cost to the Diocese of providing that ministry, irrespective of how many parishes there are in the Benefice and irrespective of how large or small the congregations. If this is what happens, we would see a large increase in our aggregate parish share.

Under the current re-organisation plans, other Benefices in the Deanery are being enlarged much more than ours – we would be the

smallest Benefice in the Deanery. As noted above, in some ways, this would be welcome, but it would have the further consequence that there would be fewer parishes and fewer regular worshippers in our Benefice to help pay our contribution to the Common Fund (i.e. our combined parish share). Most of the other Benefices in the Deanery would probably be set the same parish share as us, because they also have 1 stipendiary priest) even though they are bigger.

We need to be aware of this and plan accordingly.

The Clerk explains what happens as follows:

'Our Meetings are somewhat different from the Anglican Church. What normally surprises visitors is that we have no leader at the Meeting. We are all equally responsible, we hope to be led by the Holy Spirit. We meet in silence together and if anyone feels called to speak then they will stand and "minister". It is expected that there will always be a reasonable space between ministries. It is not a debate and a theme may or may not develop. Ministry

is expected to be reasonably short, and sometimes there may be no ministry at all during the hour.'
