At around this time of year, every parish in the Church of England is required to prepare an annual report, reporting on the activities of the Church in that parish, to be approved by the PCC and then presented to the Annual Parochial Church Meeting. Like many things in the Church of England, the underlying rationale for the rule, or practice, has

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become out of touch with the current reality. Just as the Incumbent is supposed to ring the church bell every day immediately before saying the Daily Office in the parish church, morning and evening, so as to notify the entire population of the parish that it is time to come to church to say prayers together, so the reason for preparing an Annual Report can feel a bit pointless.

The idea is that the report is made available to all the parishioners who are on the parish electoral roll when they attend the annual meeting. It gives them a summary report of everything that the parish Church community has been doing. The reality is, that with a few exceptions, often the only people who attend the annual meeting are the members of the PCC. They already know what the Church community has been doing, because they are the ones who have done it, or overseen it. The other parishioners who are on the electoral roll but who are not themselves members of the PCC, if there are any, seldom attend the meeting. So the report, painstakingly prepared in order to comply with the legal duties of the PCC, can feel like a pointless formality, a bit like tolling the church bell daily at 8.00 am and 5.00 pm.

It would be possible to get a bit grumpy about this. But there is another possible reaction, admittedly a more challenging one.

If we take it as a given that the twin purposes of a Church community are to love God and to love our neighbours (see Mark 12:30-31 and Matthew 22:36-40), then what would the annual report need to

contain in order for our neighbours to want to come to the annual meeting and read it? Put slightly differently, if what we currently do all year does not lead to people wanting to hear more about what we are up to and join in, then what should we be doing instead?

News from our Parishes

Breaking Bread - 22nd March

Breaking Bread is a new community enterprise, offering a low cost healthy meal cooked and served by volunteers, with all profits going to a charity feeding people in countries where there is famine. Last year's Breaking Bread event raised £900 for World Central Kitchen's project in Gaza, which was feeding people during Eid. We are currently planning a meal for Sudan which will take place on 22nd March in

the Community Hall, time to be confirmed. We are working with a Sudanese lady in Bristol who has a business cooking traditional food for events and food markets – she might not be able to cook for the actual event, but she is definitely going to give us a cookery lesson and help us create a Sudanese menu for the night.

Training

This month, the Rector will be attending two information / training sessions run by our Diocese. One is about the Diocesan strategy for rural ministry: how might we seek to thrive in small communities and what does the route to thriving look like? The other is about finance: as a Diocese, what are we going to do about the fact that we are living beyond our means, with our total income falling way short of our costs? Feedback from these sessions will be provided to PCCs. These are important questions and it will be very interesting to learn what the thinking is within the central Diocesan team and among other parishes like ours.

Baptism

We held a baptism by full immersion at St Mary's on 19th January when a student from Sexey's school was baptised – an interesting and joyous occasion for all concerned (if very cold for the candidate).

Christmas Services

Attendance at all our Christmas services across the benefice was strong this year, which is very encouraging.


Dusk is Dangerous

Now that the New Year is behind us, I would like to make a plea to walkers, walkers with children, walkers with dogs and joggers (as well as some bicyclists who have insufficient lighting) as you may not realise that you are often invisible on the unlit country lanes.

- Please wear at least a reflective strip, but even better a high visibility jacket
- Please walk facing the traffic if safe, as recommended by the Highway Code, which makes it easier for drivers to see you and for you to notice oncoming traffic, particularly now that many modern cars make little or no noise
- Please keep your child or dog on your inside, closest to the edge of the lane, as this is safer

Electoral Roll Renewal

This year, every parish needs to renew its electoral roll. The existing roll is discarded and an entirely new roll created. This means that anyone who wishes to be on the electoral roll must apply to have their name entered on the new roll – there is no automatic carry-over of names from the existing roll to the new roll: if you don't complete an application form and submit it in time, you will drop off the roll.

Being on the electoral roll is a good way to participate in the life of your parish church. It enables you to attend the Annual Parochial Church Meeting, to vote for elected PCC members and to stand for election yourself.

Please keep an eye out for the notices which will appear in your parish soon, with details of how to obtain an application form and the dates for submitting completed applications. We need to compile a new list that matches donors to their numbers. This is essential to submitting a valid claim so please do take note and respond. This does not apply to the yellow envelopes that bear the donor's name, only the numbered envelopes.

Notes from an Organist...

What's in a name?

I was looking through the pages of Church Music Quarterly recently, the September 2024 issue in fact, as it contained some fascinating articles. I was, I confess, intrigued by the names of the contributors as well as what they had written. If you think this is another of your mad organist's flights of fancy, do borrow my copy of the magazine and check for yourself.

David PIPE, presumably no advocate of the electronic instrument, is organist of Huddersfield Town Hall and a former assistant Director of Music at York Minster. He describes an unusual concert call Organic Doom in which he joined forces with metal bands Pantheist, Aro and Plague of Angels. Clearly a more adventurous organist than you'd guess from his name!

Emily BELS is a leading figure in promoting choral singing rather than change-ringing, as you might expect. Her article explores the challenges facing the British choral tradition.

Ian CHURCH who is – no surprise – a church organist and teacher, recounts his experience of restarting a junior choir at his church after Covid.

David W. MUSIC (sic), Professor Emeritus of Church Music at Baylor University, Waco, Texas, contributes an erudite article on the hymns of Isaac Watts, on which he is an authority.

It was in the pages of a different journal that the name of Geoffrey COFFIN caught my attention. A distinguished organist – another former assistant at York Minster – and organ-builder, his recent recording made at Selby Abbey received critical acclaim in Organists' Review. It was in vain, however, that I sought his guidance in the pages of either journal on the choice of organ music for funerals, though I have no reason to question his expertise in this field.

Finally, could any church musician have a more magnificent name than Alwyn SURPLICE? He was of an earlier generation (1906–1977), so there was no chance of finding an authoritative article by him in the Church Music Quarterly on choir robes and ecclesiastical vestments, though I'll wager that what he didn't know about such things isn't worth knowing. I'll also wager that he must once have been a cathedral chorister and that he had a friend in the trebles called Archie CASSOCK. No: that last idea *is* a flight of fancy!

Alwyn Surplice, now an obscure figure, seems to be known for one hymn tune occasionally used at Epiphany for *Brightest and best of the sons of the morning*. We normally sing the simple but uplifting tune by J.F.Thrupp (*Brightest and best*) but Surplice's tune (*Wessex*) does appear in Ancient and Modern and is the first choice in the New English Hymnal, so it must have some merit.

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Organisations from across the organ and church music world have announced Play the Organ Year 2025, a year-long project to increase the number of people playing the organ and appreciating its music. Anna Lapwood, one of the most distinguished British organists and Patron of the campaign, writes in Organists' review: 'The organ is a unique and fabulous instrument, and we want as many people as possible to discover how truly thrilling it is to play one.' She urges organists to throw open the doors and share this experience with a record number of people. For my part I will happily try to encourage aspiring organists of any age. An introductory lesson will be included, free of charge!

Death & Service

Lives cut short by illnesses, injuries, drownings, suicides, car, motorbike and aircraft accidents. The oldest was 67, the youngest just 15 years old.



After meeting Rick Davies of Supertramp in the late 1960s Steve played with Rick in a band called the Joint. Steve left the Joint to study music at the Berlin Konservatorium where he met Edgar Froese and subsequently toured and recorded with Edgar in the hay-day of Tangerine Dream. Steve went on to join Steamhammer and finally found his destiny as a solo artist, with a prolific output of albums and live performances including the iconic 'Pyramid Stage' at Glastonbury. It was in the 80's, when living in the small town of Bruton, near Glastonbury, that he was inspired to write The Bruton Suite. For one night only, Steve will perform excerpts from The Bruton Suite, married with a selection from his other various works, on the Eve of the Spring Equinox, Friday, 21 March 2025.
